Twain's love of cigars was well known during his lifetime. He once remarked, "If I cannot smoke cigars in Heaven, then I shall not go!"



Missing State Dinner Honoree Found

Lotos has always taken pride in its long list of State Dinner honorees, but new evidence indicates that a name has been excised from the list, the result of a cover-up orchestrated by the Club's first historian, John Elderkin.

The missing honoree, whose State Dinner was on April 1, 1881, is **William H. Bonney**, better known as

We had already honored an African explorer and a South Pacific king, who arrived wearing a loin cloth. We just couldn't resist the opportunity to meet an authentic western outlaw."

The Club later thought better of the invitation, and struck The Kid's name from its list of honorees. "It seemed the prudent thing to do," Elderkin explained, "especially when we realized that, at the time of his dinner, he was on the lam after being sentenced to hang."

At its meeting in late May, the Directory will consider restoring The Kid's name to the Club's list of honorees, reasoning that perhaps it will make Lotos seem more exciting.
