The Hustvedt Sisters Illness as Metaphor

On June 16, literary sisters **Asti Hustvedt** and **Siri Hustvedt** will discuss themes that inform their work: women, literature and the depiction and treatment of hysteria in modern times. Asti is a well known scholar of French literature and Siri is a renowned novelist, essayist, and art critic. (cocktails, 6:30 p.m.; \$30)

In Siri Hustvedt's bestselling novel, What I Loved, a young woman working on a thesis about hysteria in Paris 19th century inspires her lover's paintings. Asti Hustved's new book, Medical Muses: Hysteria in Nineteenth-Century Paris, is a nonfiction look at hysteria during this same period, presenting a fascinating study of three young female hysterics who shaped our early notions of psychology. In addition, Siri's memoir, The Shaking Woman or a *History of My Nerves*, is a memoir of her own struggle with a nervous disorder

Siri will also read from her latest novel, *The Summer Without Men*, which *Kirkus Reviews calls* "Lighthearted but not lightweight – a smart, sassy reflection on the varieties of female experience."

Dinner to Honor Ocean Explorer

Members won't want to miss a fascinating Science and Technology Evening on Tuesday, June 14, featuring ocean explorer **David Gallo**, director of Special Projects at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution. Dr. Gallo has led expeditions of all the oceans, most recently to map the entire debris field of the *Titanic* and to locate the wreckage of Air France 447 (cocktails, 6 p.m.; \$80).

The earth's last great frontier, oceans are almost entirely unexplored and poorly understood, yet they hold precious clues to our origins, evolution and destiny. Dr. Gallo will



introduce the audience to this unfamiliar, important and sometimes magical world beneath the sea.

After just three treatments her count was normal. My sister was astounded that she was speaking with a gentleman whose daughter had probably saved her daughter's quality of life. From the Archives

"I am tremendously flattered but..."

Even at The Lotos Club, you can't always get what you want. A file discovered in the Club archives holds letters from celebrities who were invited for festive "cocktail receptions" in the 1960s, but who replied with a polite "thanks, but no thanks."

In October 1961, Noel Coward, whose play Sail Away had just opened on Broadway, wrote that he "felt very touched," but said he would be in Jamaica. Barbara Bel Geddes, starring in Edward Albee's black comedy, *Everything in the Garden*, begged off, saying that she was "neurotically" shy. "Any public appearance, however friendly and informal, is an agony of suffering to me," she wrote to Lotos President Norris Harkness, concluding, "Forgive my frankness, but that's the real reason, so why fib about 'previous commitments' or such."

Although *Hello, Dolly!* star Carol Channing sent her regrets in 1965, her successor, Ginger Rogers, was the Club's guest later that year. Rogers was accompanied by Lotos member Peter Howard, who conducted the orchestra for the musical and coached her in the role. But a later "Dolly," Ethel Merman, begged off. "Miss Merman...follows a very rigorous and unvarying schedule on the days when she must give a performance," wrote the press representative for the play.

Twenty-three-year-old Barbra Streisand, already a star, made her excuses in 1965, as did Danny Kaye. Jackie Gleason was invited and never answered, but his *Honeymooners* costar, Art Carney, had a Lotos reception in 1968. Johnny Carson

said no in 1969, writing that his schedule on the *Tonight* show, which was still being filmed in New York, conflicted with the early evening timing of the Lotos event. "It was good of you to think of me," he wrote.

But despite these celebrity declinations, Lotos still had a glowing list of cocktail party honorees during the sixties. A 1962 reception for Anthony Quinn started early so that he could get back to the theater in time for the evening performance of *Tchin- Tchin.* Peter Ustinov came in 1963, and had time for a "plentiful buffet dinner in the men's grill" before appearing in Photo Finish. Other stars came for drinks, then ran back to Broadway for an evening performance: Claudette Colbert, starring in *Marriage-Go-Round* in 1960; Mary Martin in The Sound of Music in 1961; Jose Ferrer in 1964, when he starred in The Girl Who *Came to Supper*: Jessica Tandy and Hume Cronyn, also in 1964, when they appeared in *The Physicists*; and Angela Lansbury, star of *Dear World* in 1969. Stars have never been in short supply at The Lotos Club.

A Review "Morning Joe" Comes to Lotos by Robert Ravitz

Joe Scarborough, co-host of TV's "Morning Joe," and former Florida Republican congressman, delivered a stimulating political analysis to a packed house of Lotosians, followed by a provocative Q and A.

Mr. Scarborough bemoans the poisonous partisanship in Congress, contrasting it to the friendship of President Reagan and Speaker O'Neill, despite their political differences. To ameliorate the current contentious climate, he advocates term limits – four terms for the House, two terms for the Senate. He regards as unimpressive the current crop of potential Republican presidential candidates, believes that Romney will get the nomination, and that Obama will be re-elected. He regards the rising costs of Medicare to be the greatest threat to our economy. The "math" is obvious, but he sees no present evidence of a political compromise to arrest escalating costs.

He believes Pakistan is a very frightening country, but said that we cannot walk away because, if we do, China will exacerbate the situation. This was a prescient observation, as the next morning it was disclosed that China plans to provide fighter jets to Pakistan.

Finally, as Obama is mistrusted by many Israelis, Mr. Scarborough questioned the wisdom of Obama's taking a position on borders at this time.

As an added treat, **Mika Brzezinski**, Mr. Scarborough's co-TV host, graced the Club with her presence. A Review

Wow, what a wonderful night it was at the Club on Monday, May 16th! A gentle rain cloaked a waxing gibbous moon in a vestigial seaport mist. Here at Lotos, a hair before the Hare's full moon of May, the seeds of excellence continued to be sown.

"Two by Two by Tenn," a production of the Special Events Committee, was an extraordinarily engaging and thoughtful presentation of Tennessee Williams' excerpted works, compiled and directed by **Joan Vail Thorne**. Performing for the evening were the beautiful and acclaimed actor **Jessica Hecht**, the outstanding and renowned actor **Reed Birney**, and the exciting and estimable writer **James Grissom**.

In the Library the stage was set...bright lights on; a quietly elegant and refined crowd of Lotosians had been seated, programs in hand. White magnolias and Spanish moss loomed stage left magnificently large—a scion of New Orleans.

Mr. Grissom opened the event with a voice full of music, requiem and

eulogium, excerpting his upcoming book, *Follies of God*, which draws from his friendship with the playwright, beginning with a five-day lunch in 1982, and filled out subsequently over the next two decades by following the writerly encouragements and loving advice of Mr. Williams to "drop a memory."

Following closely, the lovely and powerful Jessica Hecht gave us a harrowing Lucretia from Portrait of a *Madonna*. The brilliant Reed Birney brought a sublime intensity to Tom's narration from *The Glass Menagerie*. In memorable conclusion, Reed and Jessica delivered a candescent stichomythic duet with I Can't Imagine Tomorrow/Dragon Country. Their endearing dialogue was so exquisitely considered by its author and so tautly played as to be at times one voice/one soul and a polished mirror before us. Legacy Program

For children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, step-children and stepgrandchildren and all of their spouses (ages 21-35) of current or deceased members, the initiation fee is waived; for those 36-45, it is 50%.

Resident Initiation Fee

New members may now choose to pay initiation fees of \$5,000 or more on a payment schedule.

New Artwork on Display

A bronze sculpture, *Walking Woman* by Gaston Lachaise, will be on display near the Members' Lounge during July and August. This classic piece measures 19 inches high, and members and guests can enjoy viewing it courtesy of Alice Levi Duncan and the Gerald Peters Gallery.

Born in Paris, Gaston Lachaise (1882-1935) used his father's woodworking tools to make carvings before he was old enough to attend school. He began his artistic career as a designer of *art nouveau* decorative objects for the French jeweler René Lalique. Although he was a promising student, he fell in love with Isabel Dutaud Nagle and gave up his place at the Académie Nationale des Beaux-Arts to move to Boston.

Lachaise's most famous work, *Standing Woman* (1932), typifies the image that Lachaise worked and reworked: a female with sinuous, tapered limbs. But he was also known as a brilliant portraitist, and he executed busts of famous artists and literary celebrities. *ARTnews* called Lachaise the "greatest American sculptor of his time."
