## Robert Gates to Be Honored



Robert M. Gates, who served as Secretary of Defense under President George W. Bush and Barack Obama, will receive the Lotos Medal of Merit at a State Dinner in his honor on Tuesday, June 25 (cocktails, 6:30 p.m.; \$140).

# Arab World Expert Is Luncheon Guest

Lotos members will have an opportunity to lunch with **Bernard A. Haykel**, one of the world's leading thinkers on one of the most important topics of the day. The Princeton professor, an expert on the Arabian Peninsula, will discuss the Arab Spring uprisings (cocktails, 12 noon; \$50).

Director of Princeton's Institute for the Transregional Study of the Contemporary Middle East, as well as Princeton's Oil, Energy and the Middle East Project, Prof. Haykel is regularly consulted by various governments on Middle Eastern affairs. He has received numerous prizes and appears frequently in print and broadcast media, including CNN, Al-Jazeera, NPR, MSNBC and *The New York Times*.

In presenting him with the Presidential Award of Freedom, the United States' highest civilian honor, President Obama called Mr. Gates "one of the nation's finest public servants, who challenged conventional wisdom and, ultimately, reduced unnecessary spending in the U.S. military by hundreds of billions."

The guest speaker at the Dinner will be **Richard N. Haass**, president of the Council on Foreign Relations since 2003. Before that, Mr. Haass was Director of Policy Planning for the United States Department of State. He is the recipient of the State Department's Distinguished Service Award.

## Bestselling Author Kathryn Stockett

**Kathryn Stockett**, whose debut novel, *The Help*, was on *The New York Times* bestseller list for more than two years, will be the guest of honor at a Literary Evening on Tuesday, June 11 (cocktails, 6:30 p.m., \$80).

Drawn in part from Ms. Stockett's own experiences, *The Help* is the story of a group of Southern women in the 1960s who build an unlikely friendship around a secret writing project that breaks society's rules. The book was made into a film that was nominated for four Academy Awards in 2011, including Best Picture.

## Building Repairs Required

Maintaining a building in New York City is costly and often disruptive. Last July, the Fire Suppression System located above the kitchen stoves/ovens was upgraded to comply with new fire codes. A subsequent inspection approved that work, but a violation was issued on the kitchen exhaust ductwork. In short, the existing "galvanized" ductwork needs to be replaced with "black iron" material. Since the kitchen is located in the basement and the exhaust fan is located on the clubhouse roof, approximately 100 feet of ductwork will be replaced at an expense of approximately \$80,000. This is a necessary, behind-the-scenes expense that cannot be postponed.

Since the kitchen is unable to operate during the construction period, and to assure that the work will be completed before the new season begins in September, the kitchen will be closed starting on Monday, August 12, and re-opening for dinner on Tuesday, September 3, 2013. Alternative dining arrangements have been made with the Colony Club (see page 2).

During the shutdown period, other building needs will be undertaken: upgrading and redecorating two overnight rooms, cleaning and flame-proofing draperies, cleaning and repairing rugs, upgrading air-conditioning and heating systems in two overnight rooms, replacing the kitchen refrigerator, re-pointing brick mortar on the upper rear northeast wall and a general, thorough housecleaning.

The overnight rooms, front desk and offices will remain open.

As most of you know by now, as of June 30, I will end my thirteen years of service as Treasurer of the Lotos Club. I have thoroughly enjoyed this position and considered it a privilege to serve. Over these years, it has been my good fortune to have served with twenty-one different members of the Finance Committee who have made my position a "walk in the park." I especially thank the chairs of that committee with whom I have served as far back as 1994 with Jeff Holzschuh and, more recently, since 2003, with Colette Mahoney, Rick Petersen, and the current chair, Rob Smit. I thank you all.

The Finance Committee continues its practice of monthly meetings throughout the year in order to monitor the fiscal status of our club and to attempt to guide us through these ever-changing times. As we are all aware, operating a small business in NYC continues to be challenging. A copy of the audited report for the last fiscal year, ending on June 30, 2012, is posted on the Club's website. As in the past, Lotos received a clean opinion by our auditors. In fact, they further complimented our club's ability to sustain an actively involved membership. They specifically cited members' participation in committee service as well as the extensive Club event programs offered each year. Kudos to all members who serve on committees, organize events and make use of the Club's services. This active participation makes us a desirable club and adds to our success.

Our commendable activities, however, did not prevent us from producing an operating loss. During the past few years, capital spending has been reduced in an attempt to conserve cash, but this cannot continue indefinitely. It is important that we find ways for operations to run at least at a break-even point and allow investment to grow at a conservative rate. This is in the best long term interest of the Club. One primary way to achieve this goal is to restore the resident membership to its mandated level of 400 as soon as possible. (Ideally, resident membership should approximate 450 to adequately support a full service club.) As of April 30, there were 378 resident and 351 other dues-paying members. We need more good individuals to become part of our distinguished club. I encourage all of you to sponsor just one candidate for membership before we convene next May for our 2014 Annual Meeting.

We are living in difficult times, but conditions are improving. We anticipate more favorable results for the current fiscal year. With your support, the Finance Committee will achieve its primary goal of balancing member services and fiscal stability.

In ending, I just want to say that, having elected **Pat Waide** as my successor as Treasurer, you have done a great service for Lotos. He is very smart, though understated, and has the experience and skills to lead us forward out of these difficult times.

# Directory Approves Dues Increases

## Bipartisan Accolades for Elihu Root

Although Robert M. Gates will be the fourth Secretary of Defense honored with a Lotos State Dinner, it has been one hundred years since the last honoree representing that Cabinet post sat at the Club's table. Lindley M. Garrison received the Club's highest honor in 1913 while serving in the Woodrow Wilson administration. President William H. Taft was the Club's guest in 1912, during his term as President. He had held the cabinet post of Secretary of War, as it was called until 1947, under Theodore Roosevelt. The first was Taft's predecessor, Elihu Root, whose State Dinner took place on May 9, 1903.

Root was a surprise pick for Secretary of War in 1899. President William McKinley wanted a top lawyer who would be able to effectively deal with overseas territories acquired in the recent Spanish-American War, particularly Cuba and the Philippines. Root was a well-respected New York litigator who had built his reputation with clearly presented arguments that were enlivened by his keen wit. He also had close ties to McKinley's vice president, Theodore Roosevelt, who called Root the wisest man he had ever met. Root had served as chair of the Republican County Committee during Roosevelt's unsuccessful 1886 run for New York City mayor, and had explained away questions about residency requirements when TR ran for governor in 1898.

By the time of his State Dinner in 1903, Root had won wide public approval for his dealings with "the colonies," encouraging economic development and material improvements, while keeping political control firmly in American

hands. Following President McKinley's assassination in 1901, Root stayed on as Roosevelt's Secretary of War.

Three hundred Lotos members packed the Club's house at 558 Fifth Avenue to toast Secretary Root. The parlors were "tastefully" decorated with pink roses and hundreds of branches of dogwood and apple blossoms. The elaborate souvenir menu (see photo) featured a photograph of Root and the State, War and Navy Building in Washington, now called the Eisenhower Executive Office Building.

After a warm introduction by Lotos President Frank R. Lawrence, Root spoke about his early years in New York. He had come to the City in 1866, from upstate Clinton, New York, and "the first deep impressions of the lad coming fresh from the country were made." He "vividly" remembered a visit to the first Lotos clubhouse on Irving Place with actor John Brougham, "that delightful master of humor and good fellowship."

But much in the City had changed during his four years in the nation's capital. Root was struck by massive construction sites for the new IRT subway extending from City Hall to the Bronx. Still, he proclaimed, New York is in "front rank in the march of civilization," despite its weakened condition resulting from "surgical operations for appendicitis," whereby "her liver and kidneys were torn out in order to provide rapid transit for future generations."

The speakers for Elihu Root came from both parties, and all applauded his service as Secretary of War. Reporting on the State Dinner the following day, the New York Herald proclaimed: "Seldom are tributes paid to any man by his political opponents...Admitting that they differed from Mr. Root in matters of political belief and international policy, Judge John Clinton Gray and W. B. Hornblower, democrat, and leader of the New York bar, gave him the highest praise for what he had accomplished in the Philippines."

The next Lotos State Dinner honoree, Robert Gates, has also received bipartisan support. Like Elihu Root, he held his cabinet post in the administrations of two presidents, but Secretary Gates served both a Republican and a Democrat. Lotos is honored to record the names of both distinguished public servants on its roll of State Dinner honorees.
